
## **REPORT ON THE 2011 SEASON:**

23 MAY-3 JUNE And 19-30 DECEMBER

#### Introduction

Two sessions of excavation were carried out at Kh. el-Maqatir in 2011: site-wide excavation 23 May–3 June under the direction of Gary A. Byers and excavations in the Area C monastery 19–30 December under the direction of Scott Stripling. Both sessions were sponsored by the Associates for Biblical Research, Akron PA. Labor was supplied by volunteers mainly from the U.S., but also from Canada and Israel. Excavation was carried out in 5 x 5 m squares with a balk between. Probe trenches were occasionally employed where appropriate. The recording system was that of the Madaba Plains Project as set forth in *Excavation Manual, Madaba Plains Project*, by Larry G. Herr and Gary L. Christopherson, Berrien Springs MI: Andrews University Institute of Archaeology, 1998.

Five occupational phases are present at the site: MB (pottery only), an LB I fortress, Iron I squatter occupation, an LH/ER fortress and settlement, and a Byzantine monastery. The objectives of the 23 May–3 June session were:

- 1. Determine if a wall with a megalithic stone discovered in the 2010 season in the SE corner of Square G17 was part of the LB fortification system.
- 2. Open new Squares P20 and P21 to determine if the walls discovered in the 2010 season in Squares Q20 and Q21 continue to the south.
- 3. Open new Squares Q25, S24 and S25 to investigate the nature of the LH/ER settlement.
- 4. Complete excavations in Squares ZF04, ZG04 and ZH04 to expose 18 m of the southern portion of the E wall of the church/monastery complex which includes the area of the apse.
- 5. Excavate a pottery kiln associated with the monastery in Squares ZB07 and ZC07.


6. To collect pottery samples for a neutron activation analysis program that was initiated with pottery samples from the 2010 season. The purpose of the program is to determine where the LB I storage vessels that are prolific at the site were manufactured in order to ascertain the political entity that was provisioning the LB I fortress. Results from the 2010 and 2011 samples are presented in Appendix 2.

In the 27–31 December session, Squares ZG05, ZH05 and ZH06 were opened W of completed Squares ZG04 and ZH04 in the church/monastery complex with the following objectives:

- 1. To determine if any of the mosaic tile flooring in the altar and nave area was still intact, and if so, to recover and protect any inscriptions.
- 2. To clarify if the three stones in ZG04 that appeared to be the spring of an arch had a matching spring in an adjoining square.
- 3. To reveal the remains of any columns or column bases that would clarify the original floor plan.

#### **Excavation Results**

Square G17, 23 May-1 June (James Luther, Square Supervisor) and Square G18, 23 May-1 June (Gary A. Byers, Square Supervisor)

In the 2010 season SW-NE Wall 6 with a megalithic stone was discovered in the balk of the SE corner of the square. In the 2011 season an area 3 m N-S by 2.5 m E-W, including the E balk, was opened to clarify the nature of Wall 6. A similar 3 m N-S by 2 m E-W trench was opened in the SW corner of G18 to expose the wall in that square. The continuation of the wall in G18 was labeled Wall 3. Even though there was a megalithic stone in Wall 6 in G17, Wall 3 in G18 proved to be only 50 cm wide and poorly constructed. It appears to be an agricultural terrace wall since it follows the natural contour of the terrain. Based on the pottery found in Squares G17 and G18, the wall appears to be LH/ER in date.

## Square O18, 31 May-1 June (Suzanne R. Lattimer, Square Supervisor)



Square O18 at the end of the 2009 season, view N. During the 2011 season 1 m of the N balk to the W of the infant jar burial was excavated.

During the 2009 season an infant jar burial was discovered in the NE corner of square O18. The remains were not in the jar, but rather scattered about in the vicinity of the jar. In 2011 1 m of the N balk to the W of the infant jar burial was excavated in an effort to recover more of the bones from the burial. A number of bones were recovered and they are being analyzed by Marina Faerman at Hebrew University Jerusalem.

Square O20, 23–27 May (Suzanne R. Lattimer, Square Supervisor)



2 x 3 m probe in the NW corner of Square O20, with bedrock at a depth of 0.88–1.08 m view N.

Square O20 was investigated with the hope of finding more evidence of the LB I structure located inside the LB I gate. A 2 m E-W x 3 m N-S probe trench was opened in the NW corner of the square. It was excavated to bedrock, a depth of 0.88-1.08 m, with no evidence of architecture being found. The pottery in the probe was primarily LH/ER in date.



A section of the W wall, Wall 9 was excavated in Square Q20 in 2010. During the 2011 season, the remainder of the plan of a structure was exposed in Squares P20, P21 and Q21. The structure is comprised of two rooms, a larger one to the N and a smaller one to the S. The entrance to the structure was near the SE corner of the larger room. Access to the smaller room was gained through an intact doorway in the center of a dividing wall between the two rooms. East of the doorway is an intact window; there was probably a similar window on the W side of the doorway which has not survived. If so, the door with windows on either side would have comprised what is known as a "window wall." The small room perhaps was used for animals. On the east side of the structure, south of the entrance, was what appears to be a cooking area, Locus 3, on the N side of Square P21. Ten registered indicator sherds from the LH/ER period found in this locus

were: 6 store jars, 2 cook pots, 1 krater and 1 jug. Objects were: 651, stoneware base, 653, shaped stone, 658, basalt grinder fragment and 660, fragments of a glass plate.

The outline of a structure could be seen on the surface in Square Q25. Upon excavation, a cistern with a square-cut opening, Locus 2, was found on the E side of the room. The walls were constructed of one or two courses of unhewn and semi-hewn stones founded on bedrock.

## Squares S24-S25, 25 May-3 June (Titus Kennedy, Square Supervisor)



Squares S24-S25, two rooms and a cistern, part of a much larger structure, view NW.

Walls of a large structure at least  $9.4 \times 5.2 \, \text{m}$  in size were visible on the surface. Two rooms at the N end of the structure were excavated in the E portion of S24 and SW section of S25. For convenience, the two squares were combined into one double square, S24-S25. The walls are

constructed of mostly unhewn small boulders, with a few semi-hewn small boulders and cobble stones, founded on bedrock.



Remains of a pottery kiln visible on the surface ca. 16 m S of the monastery were excavated 2–3 June. The kiln was a simple vertical up-draft type, with a fire box below the surface and a pottery chamber over the fire box above the surface. An opening into the fire box, the stoking pit, gave access for inserting fuel and stoking the fire. The firebox is located in Square ZC07 and the stoking pit in ZB07. The fire box and pottery chamber would have been separated by a partition floor with holes in it to support the pottery vessels and allow hot gases from the fire box to pass through the pottery vessels. No remains of the pottery chamber and partition floor were found. Only the 1.9 m diameter fire box of the kiln remained. It was constructed of medium-size semi-hewn stones lined with clay. Two Byz diagnostic sherds, 1 piece of roofing tile and 1 tessera were found in the mixed debris of the firebox. It is likely that some of the pottery being found in the church/monastery complex came from this kiln. What appears to be a second kiln, in a poor state of preservation, is located immediately E of the ZC07 kiln.

In May 2011, the E balk was removed in order to further expose the E side of the monastery. It was comprised mainly of large tumble from the exterior wall of the structure. There were scattered Byz sherds and a coin minted in the sixth year of Herod Agrippa I. This was the first coin from the first century era found at Khirbet el-Maqatir. It raises the perplexing issue of explaining a first century coin in a fourth/fifth century ecclesiastical structure.

## Square ZG04, 23 May-1 June (Scott Stripling, Square Supervisor)



Square ZG04, view E, with the S portion of the central apse on the N and the remains of a possible secondary apse on the S.

The entire 6 x 6 m of ZG04 were excavated from 23 May to 1 June. Over 5,000 medium-size, white, tesserae were found in the square. In Loci 15, 18, and 21 floor levels were evident from the abundant sections of fused, plastered, tesserae (Object 634). ZG04 produced numerous architectural features. The drainage channel which was noted in ZF04 continued into ZG04. There was 1.1 m of the channel in ZFO4 and 0.9 m in ZG04. The portion in ZF04 was carved in bedrock whereas the portion in ZG04 was plastered. About one-fourth of the central apse (L.13) of the church was exposed in the NW corner of the square. Two courses of large-to-medium stones, with portions of plaster intact, were exposed. They were dry-laid on bedrock, with chinking used sparingly. To the S of the central apse a side room was discovered that was roughly 3 x 3 m. The room rounds out on the east side, hence is possibly a secondary apse. There is a large, flat stone on the W edge (most of the stone is in Square ZG05 to the W) that appears to be a threshold. If this is indeed a secondary apse, it escaped the notice of the early explorers (Conder and Kitchner, Wilson, Thomson, and Schneider) who sketched the site when it was much more intact. This would indicate a later date (perhaps mid-fifth century) than the earlier date (fourth-century) that was assumed because of the single apse. The original structure may have been built in the fourth century and then rebuilt in the fifth century. Further excavation will be required to determine if there is a matching secondary apse to the N. Of significant note is a plastered installation (L. 25) in the NW corner of the square. It is unclear what this feature is, as only a small portion was exposed. Given that it is in the foundation of the apse, it could be a crypt or a baptismal font. Excavation of squares ZG05 and ZH05 will be required to determine this. Above this plastered installation and inside the SW corner of the apse were three large, plastered/fused, stones diagonally oriented at a 45 degree angle. They appear to be the spring of an arch.

- 20 Three large, plastered-fused stones diagonally oriented at 45 degrees inside the central apse. It was under tumble and above L.25 (plastered feature). This is possibly the foundation of an arch, or it may be a section of the apse that fell in perfect orientation.
- 21 Exterior E wall of the church/monastery. It was under tumble and a mixed matrix and over bedrock.
- 22 Area below L.18 and above bedrock in the W portion of the square between LL. 12, 19, and 21. This appears to be a side room (3 x 3 m) to the S of the central apse (L.13) or a secondary apse. The density of the tesserae in L.22 was two or three times greater than in L.18 above it. A floor level was indicated by numerous fused/plastered tesserae.
- 23 Area under L.20 and over L.25 (plastered structure) in the NW corner.
- 24 Area under tumble and above bedrock E of the exterior monastery wall. Over 1,000 large tesserae came from this locus.
- 25 Plastered area below LL.20 and 23. It is unclear what this feature was, as only a small portion was visible in the NW corner of the square. Given that it is in the foundation of the apse, it could be a crypt or a baptismal font. Excavation of the two adjacent squares (ZG05 and ZH05) will be required to determine this.

## Square ZH04, 1–3 June (Scott Stripling, Square Supervisor)

The entire 6 x 6 m of ZH04 was excavated 1–3 June. Over 6,000 medium-size, white tesserae were found in the square. Some of these were wedged in the crags of the bedrock, indicating a rebuild of the structure. Thus, there were likely at least two phases of occupation at the site in the Byzantine era. About three-fourths of the central apse (L.3) of the church was exposed. There were two courses of large-to-medium stones with portions of plaster intact. They were dry-laid on bedrock with occasional chink stones. The apse merged with the E wall of the church/monastery (L.8). A small portion of the plastered structure from ZG04 continued into ZH04, but due to its delicate nature it was not probed. Additional excavation of ZG05 and ZH05

will be required to determine the function of this structure. One of the three large, diagonally-oriented, stones mentioned in the ZG04 summary extended into ZH04. Eight coins of various ages were discovered in the interior of the apse (L.6), the earliest of which is a coin of Ptolemy III.

#### 27-31 December Season

## Square ZG05, 28–30 December (Steve Rudd, Square Supervisor)

A 3 x 4 m probe trench was opened to examine the plastered feature and arch stones discovered in the May-June season in the NW corner of Square ZG04. A matching arch spring was found 3.47 W of the arch spring discovered in Square ZG04. It continues N into Square ZH05. The plastered feature occupies the area beneath the arch in the NE corner of ZG05 and continues into

ZH05. In addition, a column base and the capital from this column base, and an *in situ* door frame with two side door stops were discovered.

The rest of the arch spring and plastered feature found in Squares ZG04 and ZG05 were found in Square ZH05. The arch, or vault, and the plastered feature beneath it occupies an area measuring 3.47 m E-W and 6.37 m N-S. The arch appears to be part of a structure which spanned the front of the church to provide support for a raised area where church services were conducted. The plastered feature possible butts up against a well marked by Wilson in 1866 and might have been a small cistern or baptistery.




