Edward Robinson, who visited Kh. el-Maqatir May 5, 1838:

"To this ruin one of the Greek priests at Taiyibeh...had chosen to give the name of Ai; and we found the same name among some of the people of the village. But there is not the slightest ground for any such hypothesis. There never was anything here but a church..."

(Biblical Researches in Palestine, Mount Sinai and Arabia Petraea 2, p. 126. Boston: Crocker and Brewster, 1841.)

Ernst Sellin, who visited Kh. el-Maqatir in 1899:

"Women of Ramallah, who were searching for snails, called it Khirbet Ai."

William F. Albright, 1963:

"Since the writer has scoured the district in question in all directions, hunting for ancient sites, he can attest the fact that there is no other possible candidate for Ai than et-Tell."

Amihai Mazar, 1992:

"There is no evidence of a second-millennium Canaanite city at this spot [et-Tell] or at any other site in the region. This constitutes unequivocal archaeological evidence for the lack of correlation between the story in Joshua 8, with all its topographic details, and a historical reality."

① Central Ridge Road ⑤ Joppa-Amman Road Central Hill Country of Israel in the Vicinity of Kh. el-Maqatir


Topographical requirements for Ai:

- 1. Strategically important
- 2. Near Beth Aven (Josh 7:2)
- 3. East of and near Bethel (Josh 7:2; 12:9)
- 4. Ambush site between Bethel and Ai, west of Ai (Josh 8:9, 12)
- 5. Militarily significant hill to the north (Josh 8:11)
- **6. Shallow valley to the north** (Josh 8:13–14)


1. STRATEGIC LOCATION

Now Joshua sent men from Jericho to Ai, which is near Beth Aven to the east of Bethel, and told them, "Go up and spy out the region." (Josh 7:2)






4. AMBUSH SITE BETWEEN BETHEL AND AI, WEST OF AI, view south



5. and 6. COMMAND CENTER AND SHALLOW VALLEY


The entire force that was with him [Joshua] marched up and approached the city and arrived in front of it. They set up camp north of Ai with a valley between them and the city.




Archaeological requirements for Ai:

- 1. Smaller than Gibeon (Josh 10:2)
- **2. Fortified in LB I** (Josh 7:5; 8:29)
- 3. Gate on the north side (Josh 8:11)
- 4. Destroyed by fire at the end of LB I (Josh 8:19, 28)
- 5. Left in ruins following the destruction (Josh 8:28)






Kh. El-Maqatir, view west-northwest




THE LB I FORTRESS AT KH. EL-MAQATIR, 2000







Discovery of the gate, 1995























West Wall, M7-M8, 2009







M7-M8 LB I wall, view north, 2010



5. LEFT IN RUINS FOLLOWING THE DESTRUCTION


So Joshua burned Ai and made it a permanent heap of ruins, a desolate place to this day. (Josh 8:28)










Twelve *elephs* of men and women fell that day—all the people of Ai (Josh. 8:25).




12th-century BC remains from the Iron Age I period in Squares Q11 and R11, the time of the Judges, view west.

Iron Age I remains from R the 12th-century BC (1200-1100 BC). This was the time of the **Judges Gideon (Judges** 6-8), Abimelech (Judges 9), Tola and Jair (Judges 10:1-5), as well as the migration of the tribe of Dan from Zorah to Dan (Judges 18) and Ruth.













